3 Forum Topics out of 9 will be the choice of each participant to attend. The schedule for the times and room assignments for each Forum will be provided at the Conference on March 5, 2019. The Forum Topics are as follows:

The Position of Our Language Within Formal Education.

Preschool - High School, for 14 years, 6 to 8 hours a day, 5 days a week, of a child's crucial development through mainstream language, or; Language Immersion / Two-way Immersion / Heritage Language / 2nd (Foreign) Language Requirement / Bilingual / Dual Language / Official Language / Language Medium / Minority Official Language Medium School / In French-Canada Francophone School / French Immersion School.

KHAW 490 Base-Level Hawaiian Fluency, Credit/No Credit, Conducted in Hawaiian, 1 Credit - An exit class required for all Hawaiian Language Majors of the College of Hawaiian Language.

A review and strengthening of Hawaiian language fluency skills with focus on the applicability to Hawaiian medium education.

The Aha Nu'ukia Summer Teacher Workshop of Pūnana Leo Hawaiian Medium Preschools.

Aligning with themes for each year helps to direct content and teaching strategies for the preschools.

Providing Teachers for a Hawaiian Medium School.

Touching families, enrolling children, moving parents into a workforce, while working for a more sustainable program.

Hawaiian Culture and Language Based Curriculum.

To facilitate achieving standards for high school graduation and continuation into tertiary education.

Becoming a Hawaiian Language Major.

Meet and learn from the experience of college students on their journeys to contribute to Hawaiian language revitalization.

Establishing a College Degree in Hawaiian.

Hawaiian has been taught at the University of Hawai'i since 1921. From the 1970's on, a new outlook of formal language learning has been combined with taking Hawaiian to the community via the Pūnana Leo Hawaiian medium preschools, advanced Hawaiian into a BA degree and now into graduate degrees.

Using Hawaiian Language Documentation for 2nd Language Learners.
